# THE IMPACT OF COVID

ne of the main tenents of TACO is "People Come First." The impact of COVID 19 in 2020 on the business, the non-profit sector and the Foundation upset the best of plans for everyone as the whole community struggled. The virus placed limitations and strains on the Foundation's ability to achieve many of its usual

objectives as well as a strain on the resources available for distribution. Through all the difficulties brought on by the pandemic, the Foundation and non-profit organizations alike found new ways to continue to serve their communities.

The difficult work done by the Board in 2018 on redefining its focus provided a formula to commu-



nicate smoothly to the non-profit community about the preferences and aspirations of the Foundation. The decision to concentrate the focus of the Foundation broadly on the arts was a prescient move. While COVID pushed private and public foundations to address the immediate needs of health, food, education and childcare, the arts struggled at all levels. The

breadth of the program descriptions in the applications sent to the Foundation for support showed how integrated the arts are in the health and well-being of the community. The final grant awards covered arts in community service, arts in culture, arts in education and arts in healthcare.

### **BRADLEY HOSPITAL**

From mural making and cardio drumming to hip-hop and improv, the healing arts engage, instruct, and inspire at-risk adolescents coping with serious and complex mental health conditions such as depression and anxiety. When Bradley Hospital opened its doors in 1931, it became the first psychiatric hospital in the nation exclusively for children and adolescents. Today, it remains the only hospital of its kind in the region, treating more than 5,000 patients annually. Their mission of delivering health with care provides a wide range of family-focused, high-quality mental health care to children and adolescents with significant psychiatric, behavioral, and/or developmental disorders. The White Family Foundation grant supports the community artists who work with Bradley's adolescent inpatients.

### **AS220**

The White Family Foundation grant supports out-of-school arts education programming at AS220 Youth's Downtown Studio, which works with 200 youth per year, and provides paid career development opportunities year-round. The program centers youth leadership and provides arts education, workforce development, and mentorship. This work closely connects to the Foundation's funding interests in the arts, youth development, leadership, and community empowerment. AS220 is a non-profit community arts organization in downtown Providence and AS220 Youth works with 450 young artists per year at 3 service sites. The program centers youth leadership and the elevation of youth of color, arts and social justice education, mentorship and peerto-peer learning.



### COMMUNITY MUSICWORKS

Founded in 1997, Community MusicWorks is a "revolutionary organization" (New York Times) with a mission to create cohesive urban community through music education and performance that transforms the lives of children, families, and musicians in underserved neighborhoods of Providence. The free, intensive after-school Youth Music Program provides students aged 6- 18 with age-appropriate opportunities for music instruction, mentoring, and leadership development.

### **DOWNCITY DESIGN**

The White Family Foundation supports DownCity Design's free after-school design program that engages 50 inner city youth ages 11-18 in the basics of architecture, engineering and construction by designing and building service projects to improve public spaces. DownCity Design was named Afterschool Program of the Year by the RI Afterschool Network.



### EVERETT COMPANY STAGE SCHOOL

Everett is a multi-disciplinary performance arts incubator in Providence, Rl. Encompassing a Company, Stage and School, its ensemble of artists create, perform, teach and mentor new generations of artists within a diverse community. This unique intertwining of a professional company, performing arts school, and theater creates a powerful learning experience for students. For 33 years, Everett artists have used improv, role playing, dance, storytelling, videography, and play to break through seemingly tough exteriors. The work our artists' mentoring youth helps them grow, emphasizes the importance of personal stories to facilitate healing, and develops emotionally intelligent, empathetic young people who are prepared to engage positively with the outside community.



### SOJOURNER HOUSE

Founded in 1976, the mission of Sojourner House is to promote healthy relationships by providing culturally sensitive support, advocacy, housing, and education for victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking; and to effect systems change. The Sojourner House offers RI's largest residential services program for victims, including 3 emergency shelters and over 100 apartment units. The White Family Foundation grant supported Alchemy, a program that engages youth, ages 12-18, who have experienced or witnessed abuse, in an expressive arts afterschool experience. The program is designed to be a safe space for the youth to express themselves using art. Activities are tailored to the interests of each group, but typically include mask making, collage, music and songwriting, poetry, dance and painting.



### **NEW URBAN ARTS**

Founded in 1997, New Urban Arts' mission is to build a vital community that empowers young people as artists and leaders to develop a creative practice they can sustain throughout their lives. The program provides Providence youth with free afterschool arts education, including mentoring, college advising, and academic support. In 2019- 20, the program enrolled 843 students, making them Providence's largest provider of free afterschool arts programs for public high school students. The White Family Foundation grant supports New Urban Arts free school year and summer arts mentoring programs that bring together diverse groups of local artists and Providence youth.



## ON STAGE THEATRICAL PRODUCTIONS

For more than two decades, On Stage Theatrical Productions Inc.'s "Give Kids a Chance" program has provided lessons and stage performance opportunities in musical theater to underserved young people of Fall River. The program's mission of inspiring students through artistic creation and shared theatrical experiences has helped young people deal with the social isolation, anxiety, and uncertainty brought on by the pandemic. The White Family Foundation grant helped to expand the program's enrollment and provide new programming (such as summer camp, outdoor plays, and on-camera "movie" work). "Give Kids a Chance," led by a staff of experienced arts-based educators, offers students 6 to 18 years old a myriad of opportunities to dance, act, music and preparing theatrical productions which hones teamwork, discipline, and focus.



# SPECTRUM THEATRE ENSEMBLE

Spectrum Theatre Ensemble was founded in 2017 with the mission to evolve the awareness, resources, and professionals that empower our neurodiverse community to achieve equal opportunity and full participation in society. STE is consciously composed of neurodivergent and neurotypical artists who produce high-quality theatre; engage and support neurodiverse artists and audiences in developing social skills, empathy, and self-determination and help generate successful and meaningful professional careers. The White Family Foundation awarded a grant to Spectrum Theatre Ensemble for their second Neurodiversity New Play Festival. Through the Neurodiversity New Play Festival, the theatre will work with upcoming playwrights from diverse backgrounds to create and share innovative theatre pieces that accurately portray neurodivergent stories and individuals.



### THE COLLABORATIVE

The Art Academy is open to students in grades K-12 from all over Rhode Island, and nearby Massachusetts, though the main focus of the program is the East Bay community of Warren. The Academy offers free or low-cost programming in creative activities after school and during the summer. The nature of the program allows the potential for students from all different backgrounds and experiences to work together on high-quality arts learning with experienced teachers and professional artists. The White Family Foundation expressly supports this program as it hopes to strengthen the East Bay community's access to strong, free programming in the creative arts.



### **GENESIS CENTER**

The White Family Foundation provided a grant to transform the Culinary Training Program to an operational café which provides paid, on the job training and entrepreneurial assistance. It serves as an education and training hub serving job seekers, employers and entrepreneurs in Culinary and Hospitality Industries and it operates out of the Providence Public Library.



### THE STEELYARD

The White Family Foundation provided a grant to support scholarship for the Youth Summer Camp which runs programs that offer solutions to issues around economic justice that participants and their families face. The program offers technical and creative skills in welding, blacksmithing, jewelry, ceramics and iron casting for 14-18 year olds. The organization provides workspace, tools, training and education while teaching craftsmanship. All youth have access to monitored open space, tools and equipment in industrial shop to practice new skills. This program provides an opportunity for teens to learn a skill and visualize themselves being able to shape their economic future. Use of the facility following a successful completion of the camp gives the youngsters a place to go and a focus for their attention. This is a well-run and thought out program serving a diverse population.




### THE ARTIST EXCHANGE


The Artist Exchange is located on Rolfe St. in Cranston. The Foundation has provided grants for a over five years for its art programs for children and adults with disabilities. It is an organization which creates an atmosphere in which creativity, learning and discovery converge and are celebrated. The Exchange reaches more than 5000 children ages 5-16. The children's program allows children of all abilities to interact in a stress free atmosphere while learning a variety of artistic elements. The program takes down the barriers to learning for many individuals. More importantly, it is in the heart of TACO's neighborhood and its programs are open to the community.

## OUR COMMUNITY COMMITMENT

he Employee Charitable Grant Program provides grants to non-profits designated by TACO employees directly. TACO encourages its employees to volunteer and get involved in local nonprofit organizations by supporting those efforts with direct grants to those organizations. TACO employees lend their support to such varied organizations as: Boys & Girls Club of Fall River, Special Olympics, LOFA County Association, Junior Achievement of Southern Massachusetts, Barrington Early Childhood Center, Claiborne Pell Elementary School, MS Dream Center, The Autism Project, Year Up Rhode Island, The Rhode Island Ovarian Cancer Alliance, Nigerian Community of RI, Hope Library, Cambodian Society of Rhode Island and the Attleboro Music Program. The White Family Foundation is proud to partner

with its employees and support their involvement in their communities.

Periodically, the Foundation receives requests from organizations for in-kind help with replacing HVAC equipment or designing an HVAC system for new construction. TACO works with various non-profits to understand their equipment need and, if undergoing reconstruction, encourages them to seek advice from one of TACO's engineers before finalizing their construction plans. While these are not gifts from the Foundation, it is our work in the community that provides access to Taco's expertise and showcases the type of impact that the company and the Foundation can make together.
